# Vocabulary Set 1

## Gaffe

(n) a socially awkward or tactless act; blunder syn: faux pas, gaucherie, slip, solecism

Everyone in my school cafeteria laughed at me as I slipped with a tray full of food – I was so embarrassed by the gaffe.

### Glut

(n) surplus; an overabundance; (v) supply with an excess syn: surplus, excess, surfeit, superfluity; overload, overfill

After his surgery, Jake was no longer capable of eating the glut of food that he used to.

In the fall, graduate programs are glutted with applications.

### **Precocious**

(adj.) showing unusually early development syn: forward, mature, gifted, talented

Those with precocious puberty develop secondary sexual characteristics at an earlier age than most.

Despite being a 9-year-old, Jake was a precocious baking master, able to create some of the most delicious cupcakes.

### **Transient**

(adj) lasting only a short time, fleeting; (n.) one who stays only a short time syn: temporary, short-lived, short-term, ephemeral, impermanent

I was incapacitated by a transient illness; thankfully, it only lasted a few days.

#### Row

(n) an angry dispute

syn: quarrel, run-in, words, wrangle

The movie star lost many admirers after his public row with his girlfriend; an appropriate consequence for all of his yelling and cursing.

# **Adjudicate**

(v) to serve as a judge; to arrive at a judgment or conclusion syn: decide, resolve, settle, judge

Only after years of experience tasting dessert is one eligible to adjudicate at dessert contests.

## Modicum

(n) a small or moderate amount

syn: particle, speck, fragment, scrap, grain

The thief was trialed and found guilty; the jury couldn't see a modicum of innocence in him.

# **Beatific**

(adj) blissfully happy; rendering or making blessed

syn: rapturous, joyful, ecstatic, seraphic, blissful, serene

After our first date I was beatific; however, after two more dates, I was anything but happy.

# Fleece

(v) to deceive

syn: cheat, gazump, pluck, plume, rob

My uncle was fleeced by a fraud email claiming to be an insurance company. They stole his identity!

# Rankle

(v) to cause anger, irritation, or bitterness; gnaw into syn: annoy, upset, anger, irritate, offend, affront, displease, provoke

The impatience of other drivers would rankle him, and sometimes he would have to pull to the side of the road and cool off for a few minutes before beginning to drive again.

### Eke

(v) to live off meager resources, to scrape by syn: be thrifty with, be frugal with, be sparing with, use economically

After the ship wrecked and the crew were abandoned on a desolate island, they learned to eke out their survival by foraging berries.

# **Capitulate**

(v) surrender

syn: yield, concede defeat, give up, submit

After a series of unsuccessful battles, the soldiers had to capitulate to the enemy.

# **Equanimity**

(n) mental calmness, composure; refusal to panic syn: calm, level-headedness, confidence, aplomb

Instead of panicking like the other crew members, the captain handled the stress of a sinking ship with equanimity and sailed it to safety before it was too late.

## **Distill**

(v) purify; extract the essential elements of; refine syn: refine, filter, concentrate, condense

Stranded on an island, Tom was innovative and able to create a system that used sunlight to distill fresh water from salt water.

### **Puissance**

(n) power, might

syn: strength, vigor, influence

After years of studying, a doctor has the puissance to save lives.

# **Contiguous**

(adj) side by side, touching; near; adjacent in time syn: abutting, very close, adjacent

The USA consists of 48 contiguous and 2 nonadjacent states.

# Libertine

(n) one without moral restraint; a dissolute person; (adj) unrestrained by morality or convention

syn: freethinking, profligate, corrupt

Many high school students turn libertine once accepted to college; with the pressure of earning good grades off, their senior year becomes one giant, wild party.

## **Froward**

(adj) difficult to deal with; contrary syn: stubborn, wayward, disobedient

Saturday school and other disciplinary actions are tools used to deal with froward students.
